What the Bible Teaches About

Dispensations

What is a dispensation?

Latin: *dispensatio*, "to deal out, to weigh out, to dispense, or to distribute."

oἰκονόμος *oikonomos* and oἰκονομία *oikonomia*, management, office from which we get the word "economy," meaning to manage, regulate, administer, to plan.

A combination of οίκος, *oikos* (house) νόμος noms (law), house law, house rule.


"Economy: the management of the resources of a community, country, etc.; the disposition or regulation of the parts or functions of any organic whole; an organized system; the management of household affairs." (Random House *Webster's Electronic Dictionary and Thesaurus*, College Edition 1992) Thus it means managing or administrating the affairs of a household. This is not a time word.

Dispensations are connected with the mysteries of God, that is, with specific revelation from God (1 Corinthians 4:1; Ephesians 3:2; Colossians 1:25).

Eph. 3:2, "if indeed you have heard of the dispensation [*oikonomia*-administration, management, plan] of the grace of God which was given to me for you,"

- 1. The action of administering or ordering something; dealing out or distributing something.
- 2. The act of administering or dispensing with some requirement.

Dispensation: A distinct and identifiable administration in the development of God's plan and purposes for human history (Eph. 3:2; Col. 1:25–26).



Dispensationalism is a theological system, which understands that God sovereignly governs the history of the human race through a sequence of divinely directed administrations marked by distinctive periods of time as He works out His plan to destroy sin and evil."

From God's viewpoint a dispensation is an administration.

From man's viewpoint a dispensation is a responsibility.

From the viewpoint of progressive revelation, a dispensation is a stage in it.

Three Essential Elements of Dispensationalism:

1. A consistent literal, historical, grammatical interpretation of the Bible.

2. A distinction between God's plan for Israel and God's plan for the church.

3. The overall purpose of God's plan for His creation is His glory. "the natural or usual construction and implication of a writing or expression; following the ordinary and apparent sense of words; not allegorical or metaphorical" (Webster's New International Dictionary).

THE GOLDEN RULE OF INTERPRETATION

When the plain sense of Scripture makes common sense, seek no other sense; therefore take every word at its primary, ordinary, usual, literal meaning unless the facts of the immediate context, studied in light of related passages and axiomatic and fundamental truths indicate clearly otherwise.

Thus,

Israel means ethnic Israel, the descendants of Abraham, Isaac, and Jacob.

Church means the church beginning at Pentecost, AD 33, ending at the Rapture.

Israel does not mean the spiritual church. Church does not mean spiritual Israel. <u>Rom. 9:3</u>, "For I could wish that I myself were accursed from Christ for my brethren, my countrymen according to the flesh,

Rom. 9:4, "who are Israelites, to whom pertain the adoption, the glory, the covenants, the giving of the law, the service of God, and the promises;" Rom. 11:25, "For I do not desire, brethren, that you should be ignorant of this mystery, lest you should be wise in your own opinion, that blindness in part has happened to Israel until the fullness of the Gentiles has come in.

Rom. 11:26, "And so all <u>Israel</u> will be saved, as it is written:

'The Deliverer will come out of Zion,

And He will turn away ungodliness from Jacob;

Rom. 11:27, " 'For this is My covenant with them,

When I take away their sins.'"

<u>1 Cor. 10:31</u>, "Therefore, whether you eat or drink, or whatever you do, do all to the glory of God." John 1:14, "And the Word became flesh and dwelt among us, and <u>we beheld His</u> <u>glory, the glory</u> as of the only begotten of the Father, full of grace and truth."

John 2:11, "This beginning of signs Jesus did in Cana of Galilee, and <u>manifested His</u> glory; and His disciples believed in Him." Eph. 1:17, "that the God of our Lord Jesus Christ, the Father of glory, may give to you the spirit of wisdom and revelation in the knowledge of Him,

<u>Eph. 1:18</u>, "the eyes of your understanding being enlightened; that you may know what is the hope of His calling, what are the riches of the glory of His inheritance in the saints," Eph. 3:21, "to Him be glory in the church by Christ Jesus to all generations, forever and ever. Amen."
